Course Description: In this class students will continue to learn language, grammar, critical thinking, and reading comprehension skills to provide the foundations of a strong English education. This course culminates in the English 2 EOC.

Formative Assessments: 30% (includes quizzes, classwork, homework, participation) Summative Assessments: 70% (includes tests, projects, essay, and performances)

Academic Honesty

Cheating, plagiarism, and dishonesty will not be tolerated. Refer to the school policy in the student handbook. The consequence is a referral to school administration. A second offense may prevent membership in future honor societies, etc.

Late Work

Work submitted one day late will receive 80% of the earned grade. Work submitted two or more days late will receive 50% of the earned grade. All late work must be submitted for grading before the end of the unit within which the work was assigned.

Make-Up Work

Make-up work is the **student's** responsibility. Students should make arrangements with me to complete missed work as soon as they return to school. It is best for students to complete make-up work either before or after school. If students know they are going to be out ahead of time, or know they will be gone for a period of time, please let me know so I can explain and give them their make-up work before or after school prior to them leaving. **Students should return completed make-up work to me within 5 days of the absence to receive full credit.**

Re-teaching/Reassessing

Students who do not achieve 79% on a formal assessment and who put forth a thoughtful and conscious effort on the original assessment are permitted to retest. Students must retest within 10 days of the original assessment, and the highest possible score will be 79%. The original score will remain in PowerSchool until the retest is completed. Retests will assess the same content as the original assessment in different format.

Classroom Rules and Expectations

- ★ Respect the teacher, your classmates, and yourself
- ★ Come to class prepared
- ★ Stay seated and quiet unless otherwise instructed
- ★ Keep hands, classroom materials, and personal belongings to yourself
- ★ Participate in classroom activities and discussions
